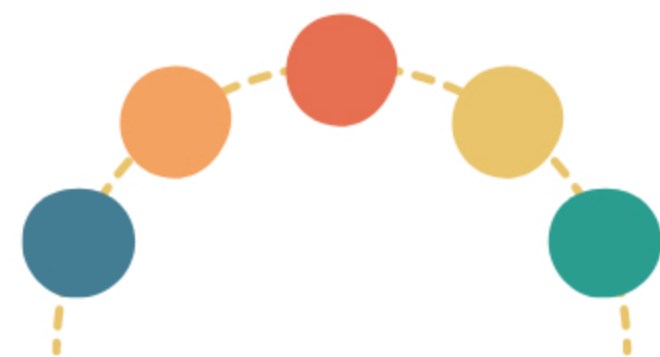
Content Organization

Record Lessons to Support Equity
